VERTICAL TUTORING

Hopefully you received the letter inviting parents & carers to the Forum that provided little detail of the work of our Learning Communities. The Forum also provided an opportunity for us to share our next exciting development: Vertical Tutoring or V.T.



As many of you are aware, V.T. is nothing new. A parent has shared how his East London school began to use a V.T. system in the 60s when he was in Year 11 or the *fifth form*, as many of us will fondly recall. Although strange at first, to be a part of a tutor group made up of students of various ages from Years 7 – 11, that same parent quickly saw the benefits of working together as a team. Issues of bullying were quickly sorted out (in a positive way), when students looked out for each other, dealing with matters through their tutors and a friendly ('honest' the parent tells me) word with a potential bully. Not unlike a 'family' atmosphere, the V.T. system also meant students with various skills helping each other – an asset when you cannot find a teacher but you need help with a homework task there and then, or of course you can seek help from someone who has already experienced a particular aspect of school life. We are also fortunate in having students at Richard Lander who have experienced V.T. first hand at their previous school and the conclusion is the positives tip the balance.

I, along with some colleagues, have met with the student council to hear their voice with regards V.T. and although some are naturally reticent about the possibility of losing some friends (judging from the experiences of other V.T. schools, this doesn't happen), there have been lots of positive suggestions to make sure V.T. works. A group of students, from another Cornish school, have met some of our School Council's Leadership Team to share their experiences of life in a school that already employs V.T. When asked whether they'd like to revert to the old year system, the answer was a resounding 'no'! We hope that the student body will continue to make positive suggestions to help us ensure that the transition to V.T. is a smooth one.

ROUND THE WORLD WITH RICHARD LANDER

On Monday 30 April the normal timetable for all students in Year 8 was suspended so that they could take part in a Super Learning Day. The aim of the day was to think about how the brain works and how they can best learn. If you know how you learn, you learn better. We believe that every student can succeed and that learning should be enjoyable, exciting and memorable.

The 250 students took part in intensive and active workshops ranging from Egyptian maths to African Drumming, from experimenting with Chinese cookery to learning Capoeira. During each workshop the students were encouraged to ask themselves, "How am I learning this?"

- Is it by listening?
- Or by watching?
- Or by doing it for myself?
- Or is it by a mixture of all these?

In the plenary session at the end of the day the students were asked to write down one thing about the day that was positive, one that was negative and one that was interesting. Some of the positive responses included, "we did things we wouldn't normally have a chance to do, "it was fun" and "nearly all the activities were practical and so kept me motivated". The most popular negative comments were "I wasn't in the same group as my friends", "yoga was really hard" and "I didn't get to do all the workshops". There were roughly equal entries for Egyptian maths under interesting and negative.

Approximately 30 members of staff of Richard Lander School were involved including teachers, trainee teachers, teaching assistants and non-teaching staff. We were also assisted by John Welham, Advanced Skilled Teacher from Camborne School, Baz Smith (Academy of Percussive Arts), April Stead and Jean Cutt (South-West Iyengar Yoga Association) and the Newlyn Reelers.

Cancer Research UK's Race for Life, supported by Tesco, is a national series of 5km walks or runs for women which will be held across the UK this summer.

2,500 women have registered to take part in this year's Truro Race for Life, which will be held at the brand new venue for this year – The new Richard Lander School site, on Sunday 15th July.



Cancer Research UK's Truro Race for Life Organiser, Scott Renken, said "I'm delighted by the response of Truro's women this year and thrilled that the event has filled so quickly!

The money raised by the women from the Truro race will help support Cancer Research UK fund around 3500 scientists, doctors and nurses based throughout the UK.
