LEARNING ABOUT HISTOPATHOLOGY

O n the 21st January Dr Garvican, a histopathologist, came into school to tell us all about his job and career pathway.

He showed us how slides from cancer biopsies are made and how to tell if a sample is cancerous or not. We had an opportunity to look at some of the slides that he brought with him and then tried to make our diagnoses using a quiz which he had prepared. This was a really informative afternoon, and you never know, we might just have had the next histopathologist in the lab.

Ms R Hall Science Teacher

Histopathologists are doctors who diagnose and study disease using expert medical interpretation of cells and tissue samples. The specialty determines the cause of death by performing autopsies and is integral to cancer management through staging and grading of tumours



WOMEN IN LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE 2020

On Wednesday 12th February, Richard Lander School staff hosted a Women in Leadership conference for female students from RLS, Penair, Penrice, Pool Academy, Roseland Academy, Newquay Tretherras and Humphry Davy. Working towards International Women's Day on 8th March, this event was aimed at supporting young women to believe in their own ability to lead and influence others.



The day started with a presentation from Lesley Feinberg, Senior Vice President at Pall Corporation, the world's largest filtration, separations and purifications company. Lesley tackled female stereotyping face-on with her confident and relaxed reaction to technical hitches 'when things go wrong, we don't panic' and her message that it is fine to be 'bossy.' Lesley went on to introduce her own sources of inspiration which included Audrey Hepburn and Dolly Parton as, perhaps, less obvious choices.

Students then took part in a carousel of activities; there was an opportunity to 'speed-date' 13 women who are currently employed in leadership roles in Cornwall in a wide variety of settings, from Systematic Anti-Cancer Therapy to liaison for Spaceport Cornwall. As well as finding out more about these working roles, students asked about journeys to leadership and work-life balance. There were also 5 workshops to take part in; communication





with confidence & developing influence, managing relationships & building rapport, impostor syndrome, embracing change & facing up to failure, developing resilience & strengthening wellbeing. Activities included Silent Chinese Whispers, a questionnaire to find out if you suffered from 'impostor syndrome' - nearly everyone did, finding positives and negatives at times of change and a challenge to build a tower from spaghetti and marshmallows.

After lunch, students were treated to a yoga session with Ms Stretch and finished the day with Mrs Madeley's team challenge; a fiendish combination of riddles, Dingbats and lateral thinking questions. With Ferrero Rocher at stake, and a room full of empowered students, the atmosphere was one of healthy competition!

All the students we spoke to said the day had been really useful to them and that they had really enjoyed talking to the guests and connecting with young women from other schools.

The world needs strong female leaders, and we can be sure that, in Cornwall, there are plenty in the pipeline!















In the Art department, we have been working on the annual combined Truro Schools Art project with Year 9.



Students learnt about the social conditions that many people face in other parts of the world and were able to use their creative skills to design and create pieces of art inspired by this. Some students made shanty houses and some created house fronts as well as other pieces. All students were able to use a fantastic range of materials and much of the work produced, went on to be selected to be displayed in the cathedral, as part of the annual exhibition for the project. The work looks fantastic; exhibited in one of the cathedral alcoves.

The private view on Tuesday 11th February also showcased the wonderful work that students from other local schools have produced and, during the evening, awards were given for high commended artwork for each participating school. Huge congratulations to Rebecca Pearson for being selected as Richard Lander School's overall winner!

The exhibition remains open to the public until the 23rd April and is well worth a visit.

Come back and see us some time please... lead guitarist Henry! We are very excited to have you as alumni!



RLS Safeguarding Update If in doubt, shout it out!





Dear Parent or Guardian,

We need your help to warn young people about the dangers and consequences of becoming a money mule.

What is a money mule?

A money mule is someone who transfers stolen money through their own bank account on behalf of someone else and is paid for doing so.

Criminals need money mules to launder the profits of their crimes.

Young people are increasingly being targeted to become money mules. They are approached online or in person, including through social media, at school, college or sports clubs. Sometimes people they know persuade them to take part, often because they are also acting as money mules.

Mules will usually be unaware of where the money comes from – commonly fraud and scams – and that it can go on to fund crimes such as drug dealing and people trafficking.

Being a money mule is illegal.

When someone is caught, their bank account will be closed, and they will have problems getting student loans, mobile phone contracts and credit in the future. They could even face arrest for money laundering which carries a maximum sentence of 14 years in prison.

What to look out for

Tell-tale signs that someone might be involved could be them suddenly having extra cash, buying expensive new clothes or top-of-the-range mobile phones and gadgets with very little explanation as to how they got the money. They may also become more secretive, withdrawn or appear stressed.

If you see something, say something

Whilst you may be concerned about involving our services, we do more than check up on children and young people's welfare.


