

huge success. Not only was it amazing to watch the year 7s have fun throughout the day, but it was also great to



VISIT TO THE UNIVERSITY OF EXETER'S ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY DAY.

A group of year 10 students spent a fun day at the University of Exeter in Penryn looking at Environment and Sustainability issues related to the textiles industry.

The University offered a selection of activities including laboratory work, investigating water quality and treatment and examining fibres under University grade microscopes (which were amazing!) We also worked on an environmentally sustainable fashion statement based on a lab coat using the ideas we had learned during the day. Another activity was based on a version of the game Monopoly but looking at the ethics of clothing retailers and how they how they consume valuable natural resources to the detriment



detriment of the environment, especially trees.

These activities enabled us to think in depth about the issues we are surrounded by in the fashion industry and also gave us a valuable introduction to the University experience.

We finished the day with a tour of the University campus, visiting the



Camborne School of mines building and Geography and Environmental Sciences. We also saw some of the lecture and seminar spaces and the laboratories. All agreed it was a very enjoyable and useful day, especially the lunchtime pasties.

#### Collaborative Schools Workshop with Sovay Berriman

**S** ovay Berriman, a well renowned local sculptor, was invited to come to school for 2 days to work with a selected group of 13 Year 9 students, as part of the Combined Truro Arts project. The theme for this year's project is 'Our World, Our Future' and Sovay's idea were to work with the students to introduce the idea in a conceptual and abstract way.

Students were engaged in discussion about what a future world might look like and they were taught about how to approach ideas in an abstract way, by simplifying and extracting important elements. Students developed ideas through drawings, text and collage in small sketchbooks and then they were given a broad range of materials and asked to start creating abstract future worlds on a small scale using



3D materials.

These small sculptures, were then developed into larger sculptures and students got to work collaboratively and combine ideas. The second session started with large scale ink drawings. Students were asked to place the sculptures in an arrangement and make abstract compositions on using ink, sticks and brushes. Final paintings were created based on a combination of the initial drawings, discussions, their ideas and concepts, collage work, the sculptures and key words that had been considered as being

important, Students responded to the challenge of thinking in a very different way and answering quite challenging questions put to them by Sovay. It was a great insight into how an artist approaches making work for an exhibition and it was amazing to see the quantity, the scale, the range and the maturity of work produced in the 2 days. The exhibition will be installed in the cathedral in June, alongside work made by other Truro schools.


