#### COMBINED TRURO SCHOOLS ART PROJECT 2020

e were invited last week to take part in a collaborative art project with 5 Truro Schools. Five Year 9 students from Richard Lander were selected to work with Year 9s from the other schools in making a large piece of art which will be exhibited at the Cathedral as part of an annual exhibition.

'Firstly we went to Truro Cathedral to observe the shapes and architecture. We sketched areas of the building with the organ playing in the background. The idea was to incorporate the abstract architecture and sweeping archways of the cathedral into shifting shades of colour in a glass mosaic.' Kirsten

Students were asked to draw sketches both inside and outside the cathedral and then simplify the drawings into shapes and patterns. There was some lovely drawings made by our talented students and it was interesting to see how students from other schools approached the sketching task.

We then walked to Truro High School as a large group and settled into the art room for the rest of the day.

'We got to make mosaics with an artist called Sam Elliott who taught us how to cut and shape the glass. We were split into 5 different groups to make a section of the overall mosaic, taking pieces of glass and shaping them to fit in the gaps.' Lily


The students worked well as a team with students they didn't know, making decisions about design and how to create their group piece. There was an amazing assortment of glass pieces to work with and we were taught how to cut, trim and grind the glass to any shape or size. At the end, we put the 5 panels together and it formed a beautiful circular mosaic with a rainbow of colours.

The artist will do the final grouting and the next time we see it will be as a floor piece in the cathedral as part of the CTSAP exhibition, which opens on February 11th.













#### TERRACYCLE UPDATE - 20kg of diverted waste raises £40 FOR LANDER4UGANDA!

hank you to all the people who donated to TerraCycle last term. We sent a shipment at the end of term of **16kg** of crisp packets and **4kg** of bread bags. This earns a total of £40 which will go towards Lander4Uganda fundraising, and diverts 20kg of rubbish from landfill/incineration.

In total we have sent 38kg to TerraCycle and the process is being made simpler and more streamlined so we hope to send even more in the future. Thanks again for all the contributions, especially to Tremorvah Industries who have been TerraCycle superstars! Thanks also to those of you who helped us sort the waste at the last minute.



#### **ECO-SCHOOLS / RLS CLIMATE ACTION GROUP UPDATE**

he RLS Eco-Schools team have been working very hard on our bronze award. They have formed an ecocommittee and are meeting fortnightly. They have completed an environmental review of our school which considers biodiversity, energy usage, global citizenship, healthy living, litter, marine life, school grounds, transport, waste & water usage, and uses the information gathered to create an action plan which initially focusses on three main areas. The three main areas which have been chosen are energy, waste and biodiversity. During the election, Eco-Schools students painted 'Vote Planet' and 'Vote for our Future' on the back of old banners and hung them on the school railings to encourage voters to consider the climate emergency. Next week, some students from the Eco-Schools group are going on a visit to the Cornwall Energy Recovery Centre, there are also plans in the pipeline for a visit to the Bodmin Recycling Centre. Keep your eyes open for the new Eco Schools noticeboard which will be going up in the next few weeks.

Students from the Eco-Schools meetings attend monthly RLS Environment Action Group meetings to discuss ways to improve Richard Lander School's carbon footprint with the Headteacher, School Business Manager and other staff. As a result of these meetings, our water fountains are being changed to a design which makes it much easier to refill water bottles; this is currently taking place during the evenings. We are looking forward to the appearance of dried mixed waste recycling bins in school. It is very important that we only put recyclable items in this bins so we will be printing guidance on this in the next bulletin. Richard Lander School is heated with gas central heating and we are





working on reducing our gas consumption by turning the thermostat down a degree. We will be able to bring you consumption figures as to how this improves our carbon footprint in the near future.

Members of the Environment Action Group recently held a Skype call with nutritionist, Hannah, from Autograph Catering who provide the food in our canteen. As a result of this we are delighted that there are now vegan options on the menu every day. More on this below.

Representatives from Eco-Schools and the EAG have been working with other members of the community to share concerns, ideas and potential solutions. Holly, Joel, Miss Wright and Mrs Jones travelled to Trythall Primary School on Wednesday to meet staff and students from other schools in Cornwall, they also enjoyed a tour of the amazing Trythall Permaculture garden, which includes a pond, a poly tunnel, chickens, a Celtic maze made from unwanted turf, a 'growing and education' area made from recycled pallets and is surrounded by native species hedging which has been planted by the parents. There was a presentation from Janine Bisson from Cornwall Council on the council's commitment to become carbon neutral by 2030 and the level of change needed from us all. Pirate FM were also at the event to make a film, which we look forward to seeing soon. Thank you very much to Janine for organising this event.

Students have also been attending 'Education, Climate, Wellbeing and Collaboration: Joining The Dots' meetings with members of the wider community. There are a wealth of experts at these meetings, with dedicated environmentalists, representatives from Cornwall Council, local business and people who work with young people in all capacities. Everyone is committed to supporting young people in the face of climate emergency.

The school council meetings, which were held last term, all raised our school's carbon footprint as a major cause for concern, along with a lack of obvious recycling facilities, showing that the climate emergency is a priority for the majority of our students. The Extended Leadership Team have been discussing the minutes to these meetings this week and there is a longer report on the school council findings later in this bulletin.

Eco-Schools is a global programme engaging 19.5 million children across 67 countries, making it the largest educational programme on the planet. For nearly 25 years Eco-Schools has been empowering children to drive change and improve their environmental awareness through the simple Seven-Step framework in order to achieve the international Eco-Schools Green Flag award. ## THE SCHOOL CANTEEN Juggraph

n the past, students and staff have raised concerns that there were not enough vegan options available in the school canteen and that food was not clearly labelled as to whether it was suitable for a vegan diet or not.

Following a Skype call with Hannah Baugh, the nutritionist from Autograph, and a lot of hard work from Pixie and the canteen staff, we are delighted to tell you that there are now vegan options on the main meal menu every day and there are also a number of exiting new 'grab and go' options on the counter. For example, for £1.15 you can buy a slice of vegan pizza complete with mozzarella style cheese, or you can try a 'mozzarella' and pesto savoury pastry. For £2 you can purchase a roasted Mediterranean vegetable





baguette, a 'mozzarella' and tomato baguette or a hummus and salad baguette, all of which are freshly made, every day, on the school premises. There are also 3 different types of vegan pre-packed Urban Eats sandwiches.

For vegans with a sweet tooth, there is a choice of flapjack, 2 types of

homemade cookie and chocolate crispy cake.



The new main meal menus are listed below and provide a really tasty and exciting lunch for us all with themed meals from around the world and all food is now clearly

labelled. Thank you very much to Hannah Baugh, Pixie and the canteen staff for making this happen in time for Veganuary:)



Please note, all of these options may not be available every day; Pixie and her team are working out which options are most popular with staff and students. However, there will certainly be a variety delicious vegan food in the RLS Canteen everyday!

#### **SCHOOL COUNCIL UPDATE**

ear the end of last term our school councils met to discuss the most pressing issues as identified by our student body. Tutor groups select 3 representatives to become school council members; 1 representative is from years 7/8 and 2 are from years 9/10. These representatives meet at termly school council meetings. The Junior School Council meetings involve student representatives from years 7 & 8, the School Council is made of students from years 9 & 10 and year 11 students meet as a Senior Council. Minutes are taken at all of these meetings and sent to the ELT (Extended Leadership Team) who discuss everything raised and use these discussions to inform school policy making decisions.

Many of the issues raised at last terms meetings focussed on our school's impact on the planet. Composting and waste, a desire for the school to use renewable energy, preferably solar panels, an end to single use plastic packaging in the canteen and the rate at which white board pens are thrown away were all highlighted as areas for change. The water stations around school are not working for students who wish to refill bottles. Students would like to see more wild flowers, have the opportunity to grow fruit and vegetables in school, to take part in beach cleans, litter picks and other community events. Many delegates thought that students who have been sent to the referral rooms should be sent out to pick up litter.

Students would also like more eco-awareness assemblies and a whole school 'Eco Day.' Towan would like the opportunity to create art from plastic waste.

Many students questioned whether the school planner is now redundant, or whether perhaps it should be reduced to a lanyard calendar and timetable.

Students would like staff to consider a redesign of the canteen to have 'Harry Potter' style benches and tables and to consider building a properly covered outside eating area to relieve pressure on our crowded canteen. Some school councils offered to fund raise to buy a container to convert or an Elliott hut.

And finally, something our parents can help us with, students are very concerned about idling engines at picking up and dropping off times. Air and noise pollution aren't nice for anyone. Please switch off your engine whilst stationary.
