Coronavirus/ COVID-19 Update: Partial School Closure

Please note that this communication replaces the communication sent to parents yesterday.

Due to the significant number of additional staff absence today and into the longer term, a decision has been made to close the school to Years 8-10 students, from Thursday 19th March, until further notice.

The school will remain open for Years 7 & 11 students plus students in any year group whose parents work in the NHS, who will be offering front line support at this time.

We regret that this decision has to be made but we do not have the teaching or support staff capacity to extend our delivery beyond Years 7 & 11 at this time.

(Please note that levels of staff and student absence are increasing on a daily basis and this communication may well be amended again in the coming days or weeks.)


he grand finale of RLS Science Week was the Science Fair with the sports hall filled with groups of students and trade stands with activities and displays to demonstrate scientific phenomena. From fossil excavation to hydraulics, static electricity to lava lamps, the solar system, potato clocks, the science behind human memory, an 'invisible' test tube, a 'volcanic' explosion, black holes, a prosthetic limb, an app which uses GPS to find a safe space, balloons powering cars and rockets, reactions inflating rubber gloves, sweets demonstrating how different liquids are absorb and how colours disperse..the variety of scienctic topics covered was huge and each and every stand was extremely well researched and presented.













The RLS Science Fair is now in its fourth year and it has grown from a single classroom to the largest indoor space in the school! ## CANCELLATIONS AND POSTPONEMENTS DUE TO CORONAVIRUS

Not surprisingly, our busy school calendar is now looking rather empty. Here is a list of confirmed disruptions but this is by no means exclusive.

- Sports fixtures cancelled until further notice unless you have been specifically told different.
- The Ten Tors programme will be cancelled as this is an event which involves many hundreds of people and also requires shared student accommodation in tents.
- Y10 work experience and curriculum enrichment week are cancelled. We cannot justify sending children to the workplace when the government are advising workplaces, wherever possible, to have their employees working from home
- Foreign trips (including trips to Barcelona, Munich & Uganda) will be cancelled. The Year 7 trip to the Ardeche in July is still under review.
   We will communicate with parents in due course regarding reimbursement of monies paid for trips. (More information will be forwarded to parents whose children were due to go on the 2020 Uganda trip, following a parents meeting this week.)
- Year 11 Ball will not happen in June. Staff are considering alternatives.
- All school assemblies will be cancelled until further notice, to avoid having large assembled groups in school where we can avoid it.
- All in-school exams will be cancelled as they also put a large number of students into close

- proximity. Some subjects may choose to issue exams in class time, but we will not be assembling students into large groupings for exams purposes.
- All parents' evenings will be cancelled until further notice.
- A decision will be taken in due course regarding other extra-curricular events such as the Duke of Edinburgh programme.
- Cornwall Music Festival has been cancelled. Message from Miss Jones - On behalf of Mr Gibbons, Miss Foxon and myself, can I just take this opportunity to congratulate all the students who have participated in Music ECAs and extra rehearsals to prepare for the music festival. The musical quality has been of the highest calibre and we will find the right time for you to perform your music that you have been working so hard to polish in your respective ensembles. Well done everybody, your teamwork is inspirational.

#### But..


- School transport will remain unaffected as this is managed by the Local Authority.

If you have noticed that something wrong, other people might have too. A teacher, health visitor or other person that knows the family might have already alerted us, and your knowledge might fill in some missing information that can help.
