• ongratulations to the RLS debating teams who took part in the Youth Speaks competition yesterday evening, hosted by Truro Rotary at Carnon Downs Methodist Church Hall. For the first time this year, the Youth Speaks competition has adopted a new debate format where each team consists of three members with each taking a specific role: a Chairperson, a Proposer (speaking for the motion) and an Opposer (speaking against the motion).



Teams are allocated a total of 15 minutes to present their debate with the recommendation that both the Proposer and Opposer speak for 5 minutes with the Chairperson taking up the remaining 5 minutes for the introductions, a question and summing up.

A system of lights is used to indicate times: Green – start; Amber – one minute to go (14 minutes); Red – end of allocated time (15 minutes). If a team goes over time, penalty points are incurred.

Our Y8 'Pink' team debated 'Gender equality is an impossibility'

Our Y8/9 'Green' team debated 'Climate change is the greatest threat in human history'

Both 'Pink' and 'Green' performed superbly; presenting well-researched, well-expressed arguments with passion and pizazz to an engaged audience. ECO-SCHOOLS TRIP CORNWALL ENERGY RECOVERY CENTRE

L co-Schools students visited the Energy Recovery Centre (CERC) last week. CERC opened in 2017 and handles 240,000 tonnes of domestic waste each year, which can power up to 21,000 homes. The visitor's centre is really interactive with quizzes and a team challenge which appealed to our very competitive students. SUEZ make it very clear that Reduce, Reuse, Recycle are much, much better for our planet than Recovery, even though the recovery method of dealing with waste produces electricity. This is due to greenhouse gas emissions and scarcity of resources. Recovery is better than landfill though because landfill produces methane (21x more potent that CO2) and leachate. Thank you ever so much to Emma Emmens for the really interesting tour. The Eco-Schools team are now looking forward to visiting the Bodmin Materials Recycling Facility Visitor Centre later this term. These photos show the visitors centre, a grabber turning over the black bags of

waste and Emma showing us the difference in temperature within the waste stack.

As part of Richard Lander's work towards International Women's Day on 8th March 2020, we are hosting a Women in Leadership Conference aimed at supporting young women to believe in their ability to lead and influence others.

As of June 2019, only seven percent of FTSE 100 companies had a female chief executive officer at the helm of their organisation. For FTSE 250 companies there were even fewer female CEOs with just five companies having a woman at the head of these businesses.

Gender inequality in the workforce is an issue future generations will continue to face; recent research shows that at the current rate of progress it will take another 108 years to reach gender parity (World Economic Forum Global Gender Gap report 2018).

More gender diversity, particularly in corporate settings, can translate to increased productivity, greater innovation, better decision-making, and higher employee retention and satisfaction. (Morgan Stanley: An Investor's Guide to Gender Diversity 2017)

Working within education to change cultural gender stereotypes is key to speeding up that pace of change. Our conference aims to:

- encourage young women to see themselves in leadership positions
- allow young women to recognise the benefits they bring to leadership positions
- support young women to challenge cultural stereotypes in their day to day lives
- examine the barriers currently facing female leaders (and future leaders)
- support young women in developing a deeper understanding of the skills, qualities and attributes needed to be a successful leader

During the day students will meet inspirational women of all backgrounds and take part in activities that will develop skills and challenge aspirations. Workshops include:

- communicating with confidence, developing influence
- managing relationships and building rapport
- Imposter syndrome: what it is and how to overcome it
- embracing change and facing up to failure
- developing resilience and strengthening mental wellbeing

"It's the next generation that will close all these gaps. It's our responsibility now to open up all these conversations and opportunities, so the next generation of female leaders can come in and be the change we want to see" Shelley Zalis, CEO of The Female Quotient.
