RICHARD LANDER RACING - FIRST PLACE, SECOND PLACE AND A HAT TRICK AT THE 20TH GREENPOWER INTERNATIONAL FINAL!

Young people from over 100 education institutes and youth organisations descended on the world-famous Silverstone Circuit for the Greenpower International Final on the Thursday 17th October. The Greenpower Education trust is a charitable organisation setup to promote the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) subjects, through the design and build of electric racing cars. Races are held around the UK and also further afield in the USA, China, Brazil, and Europe. All cars run the same batteries and motor, and must aim to complete the greatest distance over a 90 minute race, two of which are run at each event.

Richard Lander School has an incredibly dedicated team of drivers and engineers who work all year towards this annual final. In 2017, after many years of coveting this title, Richard Lander Racing became international champions; the team held their title in 2018 and were very keen to maintain it once more to take a





championship ‘hat trick’ this year. To add to the excitement RLR had developed a second high spec car—RLR4, to replace the old kit car - RLRK..

Final day started with a practise run of the track with RLR3 finishing in 3rd place and RLR4 just behind in 4th place. For many this would have seemed like an excellent start with 100 competitors on the circuit, but Richard Lander Racing knew they had to do better. The second race saw RLR4 move into second place with RLR3 slipping to 20th..

Everything rested on the final race which began at 3:30 pm with all competitors challenged to complete as many circuits of the track as they could before they ran out of power.

After just over an hour and a half the results were clear, the RLR3 team had done it! RLR3 victorious having completed 28 laps of the track, with an average speed of 29.8 mph, in 1h 32 minutes and 29 seconds . To add to Richard Lander Racing’s glory, RLR4, our other car, finished in second place having driven an impressive 27 laps in 1h 30 minutes and 17 seconds at an average speed of 29.4 mph! For those who love numbers, the scoreboard below provides more information. Whilst some other cars managed to limp on for longer than our winning cars, their distance travelled did not compete. The elated RLR teams stepped up to top and second spots on the podium to receive their trophies!

Richard Lander Racing are not taking this remarkable success for granted. There were many years when the team suffered mechanical problems, a few crashes and felt much frustration as the championship title always slipped out of their reach. We asked Oliver Clarke, who is RLR3 Team Manager, along with his twin Max Clarke, what the secrets of Richard Lander Racing’s recent success are.

‘My job is to make sure everyone in the team is supported and knows what they are doing, whether they are drivers or pit stop workers. On the day, everyone performed impeccably, we were a well-oiled machine and I think this was a major contributor to our success, along with trusting our well thought out decisions even if they initially didn’t put us in the lead.’

THE 1ST SCHOOLS' ENVIRONMENT CONFERENCE

PENRYN CAMPUS - 29TH OCTOBER 2019

On Friday 20th December, Richard Lander School, along with all the other secondary schools in Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly declared Climate Emergency. One of the ten commitments we signed up to was to attend a schools' environment conference. This event was co-organised by Mr Webb, our new Assistant Headteacher, and was hosted by the University of Exeter, at their Penryn Campus, with 28 Cornish secondary schools in attendance along with primary school staff who are planning their own conference.

The atmosphere was suitably grave but there was a feeling of opportunity and momentum in the air. The day began with 4 excellent speeches from local students who are studying at all levels in Cornwall, from primary to Masters , on the challenges we face to avert climate disaster. This was followed with a presentation from students from Woodstock Day School in New York City, on an award winning **Eco Challenge** initiative they took part in last year. The delegates were then invited by Juliet Osborne to decide on the 3 main climate issues that we need to address immediately.

After some discussion it was agreed that the main priorities are:

1. Those in power accept climate emergency, yet do nothing to prevent it
2. Dependency on fossil fuels.
3. Meat and dairy industry

Waste and manufacture came a close 4th.

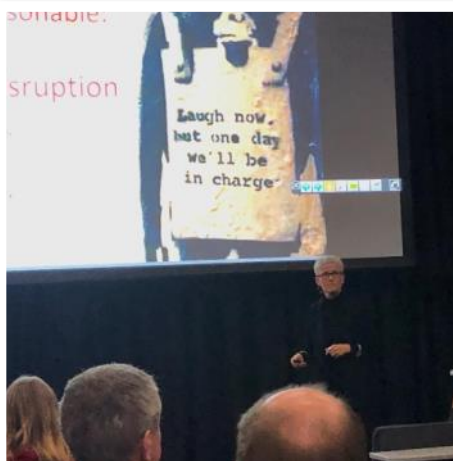

The main presentations the took place; the first, from Stephan Harrison, Professor of Climate & Environmental Change, University of Exeter, focussed on the scientific case. Professor Harrison is an expert on glacial retreat and it was particularly interesting to see his photographs documenting this. The second speech, from Manda Brookman, of Extinction Rebellion, focussed on the campaigner's viewpoint. Manda has been involved in both London rebellions and shared photos of her friends who have lived very respectable lives as a librarian, teacher and doctor and are now feeling so desperate that they had locked themselves to each other to protest government inaction in the face of climate emergency. Pupils were then given the opportunity to ask questions.

After lunch, all students took part in a carousel of activities designed by the University of Exeter. Each student took part in 4 of the following:

Workshops on Food Security, Climate Justice, Renewables, Textiles, a discussion on the Green Charter and how to action its ten

points within our respective schools, a 'Question Time' style panel discussion with the key speakers along with Edwina Hannaford, Portfolio Holder for Climate Change and Neighbourhoods at Cornwall Council and Janine Bisson, STEM – Project Co-ordinator Education Business Partner at Cornwall Council.

Richard Lander School students enjoyed being taught to darn as part of the textiles workshop which aimed to persuade us, through this empowering task, to try repairing our own clothes whilst encouraging empathy with workers in the textiles industry, and avoiding indulgently purchasing endless fast fashion.

The food security workshop presented 6 everyday food items and invited students to discuss a problem with each of them and the impact this has on the climate. From the environmental devastation of palm oil plantations and monocrop rice plantations, to over fishing and unsustainable and cruel aquaculture , flown in exotic fruit and out of season vegetables, it was clear that we need to consider our shopping lists more carefully in the future.

The day ended with the Green Charter



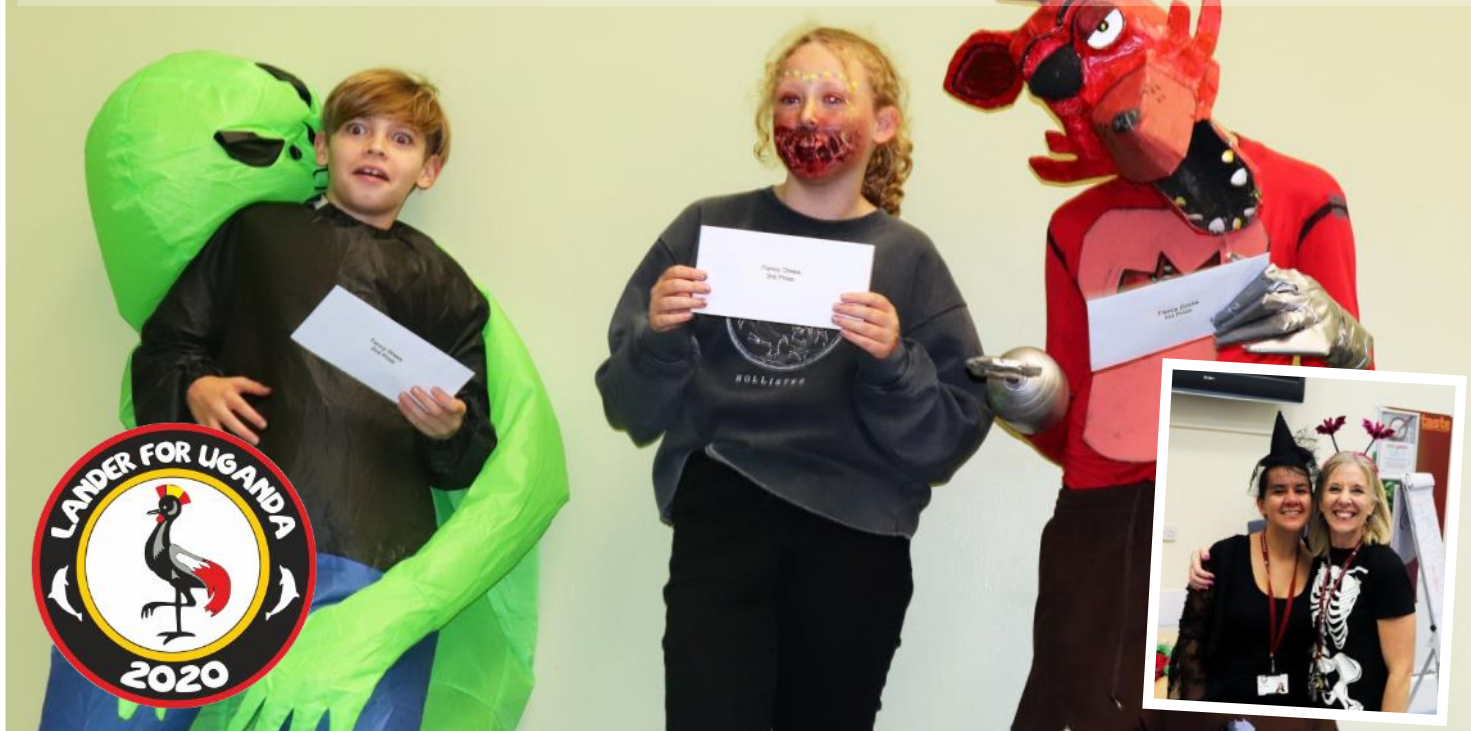
discussion and a real determination to work to radically reduce Richard Lander School's impact on the planet.

Arts Award Bronze 2018-19: Students pass external moderation to achieve their award

Another successful year for Arts Award Bronze at RLS has concluded with a 100% pass moderation on Thursday 17th October. The 15 students who began the award at the start of Year 10 ran workshops, visited arts events and researched practitioners in pursuit of their Trinity College London accreditation.



Arts Award is a range of unique qualifications that supports anyone aged up to 25 to grow as artists and arts leaders, inspiring them to connect with and take part in the wider arts world through taking challenges in an art form - from theatre to digital art, orchestra to animation. The Bronze Award helps pupils to develop skills in research, presenting to a group of people, formulating and expressing opinions, assessing their own artistic skills and how to improve them, as well as preparing pupils for further education and jobs within the creative arts and the wider employment market.

To achieve a Bronze Arts Award, young people need to gather evidence in an individual arts log or portfolio, demonstrating their experiences of:

- *actively participating in any art form*
- *attending at least one arts event and their review of that event*
- *researching the career and work of an arts practitioner*
- *planning and delivering an arts skill workshop*

Here at Richard Lander we hope the Arts Award will give pupils a worthy qualification for the theatrical, musical and artistic activities many already undertake, as well as maintaining and increasing pupils’ interest and enthusiasm in the arts in general. We also believe it will prepare pupils well for the level of independence required at GCSE and beyond.

Drama teacher and Arts Award Co-ordinator Mrs Amy Nortje praised the cohort on developing portfolios containing such a vast amount of detailed evidence that reflects the depth of arts experiences our students dedicate themselves to.

Artsmark Platinum: The Team!

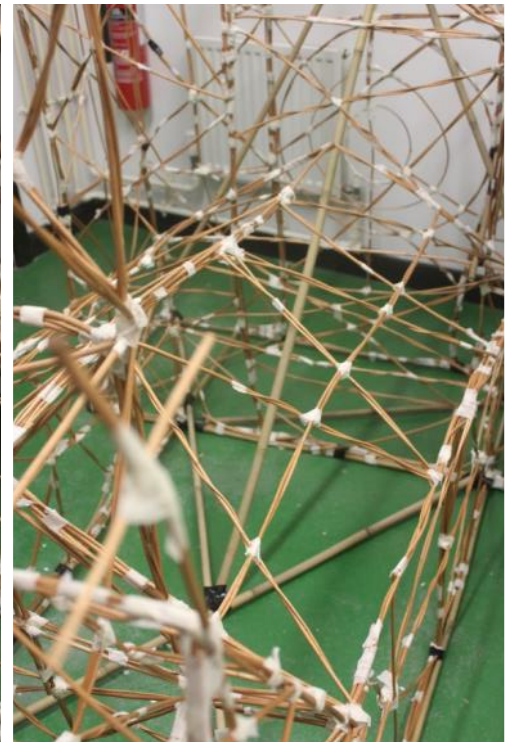

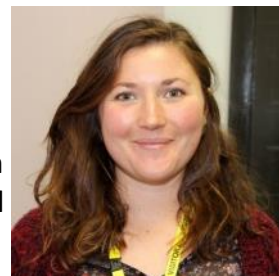

Dear Parent or Guardian,

We need your help to warn young people about the dangers and consequences of becoming a money mule.

What is a money mule?

A money mule is someone who transfers stolen money through their own bank account on behalf of someone else and is paid for doing so.

Criminals need money mules to launder the profits of their crimes.

Young people are increasingly being targeted to become money mules. They are approached online or in person, including through social media, at school, college or sports clubs. Sometimes people they know persuade them to take part, often because they are also acting as money mules.

Mules will usually be unaware of where the money comes from – commonly fraud and scams – and that it can go on to fund crimes such as drug dealing and people trafficking.

Being a money mule is illegal.

When someone is caught, their bank account will be closed, and they will have problems getting student loans, mobile phone contracts and credit in the future. They could even face arrest for money laundering which carries a maximum sentence of 14 years in prison.

What to look out for

Tell-tale signs that someone might be involved could be them suddenly having extra cash, buying expensive new clothes or top-of-the-range mobile phones and gadgets with very little explanation as to how they got the money. They may also become more secretive, withdrawn or appear stressed.
