#### **COVID – VENTILATION IN CLASSROOMS**

As the weather is getting cooler, the temperature in the school is also reducing and in some areas of the school where all the windows in a classroom are opened to increase the ventilation this is causing some discomfort to both staff and students.

We have sought advice from the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) and the Chartered Institution for Building Services Engineers (CISBE) to ensure that our advice to staff minimises the risks of airborne transmission of COVID.

In the colder, winter months we have directed staff that not ALL of the windows in their classroom need to be open all the time. They have been asked to open all the windows during the lesson change overs between bubbles to allow fresh air to blow through the room, but have been asked to close the majority of windows (leaving just one or two open) when there is a class in the room. This will maintain some fresh air circulation in the room.

We are allowing the wearing of coats and school hoodies in classrooms during lessons if the temperature is uncomfortable. Along with all of the other mitigations which we have put in place; cleaning of the desks between classes, frequent hand sanitising, mask wearing in communal areas, seating plans in the classrooms and 2m distancing from members of staff, these methods of maintaining ventilation, air movement and fresh air in the room will reduce the risks of airborne transmission of COVID.

#### **HEALTHY WORKPLACE GOLD!**

We are delighted to announce that, over lockdown, Mr Bridger completed the annual Healthy Workplace audit and online assessment and through his hard work, Richard Lander School achieved a GOLD award! After 5 years of trying the goal is achieved!

If students see red-faced staff leaving school later than usual on a Wednesday or Friday, this may well be because they have attended one of Mr Cook's excellent fitness sessions which have played a really important part in gaining this award, along with school leadership which promotes staff health and wellbeing and Mrs Chilcott, our medical officer, who takes wonderful care of staff and students alike.



#### LANDER4UGANDA UPDATE

## How are our friends in Uganda coping with Covid19 and how are we helping them?

As parents and students will know, Richard Lander School has close links with the Molly and Paul Childcare Foundation schools in Uganda. Each year, a party of Richard Lander students visits Molly and Paul schools in Bunjaako and Kamuzinda. To support this, our students raise many thousands of pounds which goes towards school and community development projects we support in Uganda.

Since the COVID-19 lockdown, all Ugandan schools have been closed and Ugandan students have had to remain at home, including boarding students. On a wider community level, strict lockdown procedures have been put in place which has made life very difficult for Ugandans. There has been a tripling of food prices and a lack of food supplies, which has led to deepening levels of poverty and malnutrition.

As a result of COVID-19, our 2020 student trip to Uganda had to be cancelled and our 2021 trip postponed until 2022. Our students had raised almost £30,000 towards school and community projects in Bunjaako and Kamuzinda and so a decision was taken over the summer to commit most of these funds to an agricultural project which would serve the needs of the Molly and Paul Schools. The project involved fencing off 12 acres of land, then preparing and cultivating maize and beans, which are the staple foodstuffs for most Ugandans. Some of the funds were also put







towards developing an irrigation system for 5 acres of the land, and we hope to support the irrigation of the remaining 7 acres in future years.

The first harvest has already been completed and crops have been sown for a second harvest in the spring. These crops have been used to feed the local communities of Bunjaako and Kamuzinda, and particularly those families whose children attend the Molly and Paul schools.

The government has recently announced the return to

















school for students in their examination years (students who are in the equivalent of UK Year 6, Year 11 and Year 13 year groups). Much of the harvest has been stored so that these children can be fed when they return to school, as well as other year groups who will hopefully return to school at some point in the future.

Whilst our 2020 trip was not able to go to Uganda and our 2021 trip has been postponed to 2022, we thank all students who were fundraising for these trips. Your efforts have helped ease the poverty and food shortage faced by many of the children who attend the Molly and Paul schools, plus their families.

We will continue with our fundraising efforts so that all students in all Molly and Paul schools are able to have at least 1 good meal a day.

We express our sincere thanks to any student, parent or family who has donated to this cause, and who will donate over the next year so that this agricultural project can be sustained.

#### **RICHARD LANDER SCHOOL BULLETIN: 9TH OCTOBER 2020**



As parents will be aware, Richard Lander School has supported the Molly and Paul Foundation schools in Uganda for more than ten years. The Foundation provides a free, or very low cost education to thousands of children living in rural Uganda.

In March, Uganda introduced one of the most stringent lockdowns in Africa, banning cars and public gatherings, shutting down shopping centres, places of worship, schools and entertainment centres, and putting in place a night-time curfew. Although most of the other measures have been relaxed since June, schools and places of worship remain closed and the curfew remains in place. In Uganda, there are currently 15 million children out of school and many parents and guardians have struggled to earn a living after businesses were shut down. Children have very little access to educational materials, and parents are struggling to provide food to feed their families. Girls in particular at increased risk from unplanned pregnancies or early marriage.

This week the Molly and Pauls Schools have been informed that they can re-open to children in exam years. Like in the UK, they have to put increased measures in place to support improved hygiene, and strict social distancing.

Since we have been unable to support our partner schools through our trip this year, we have donated our fundraising reserves to an agricultural project which aims to provide food for students once the schools reopen. Alongside this we want to continue fundraising to support the provision of education for children who would otherwise be unable to access school.

One of our fundraising streams is <a href="Bag2school.com">Bag2school.com</a> who

collect and recycle clothes and textiles, the school receives a payment by weight for everything collected which can be donated directly to the Ugandan Schools to help pay for reopening.

If you are having a clear out at home, please bring it into school and we will add it to our next collection. Please see below for a list of items Bags2school collects. In addition, we accept donations of our school uniform once it has been outgrown and sell it to parents to support the charity. Please drop in any unwanted school uniform to main reception, and if

#### **SUBSIDIES FOR INSTRUMENTAL/VOCAL TUITION**

The Cornwall Music Education Hub is committed to ensuring wider access to music for all children and young people. In

order to do this, the Hub works with Cornwall schools and Hub Registered Providers to help provide free or subsidised instrumental/vocal tuition for school-age children. Please note that this funding does not include students attending FE or HE institutions as it is provided by Cornwall Schools Forum and administered by the Hub on their behalf).

If the child meets one of the following criteria and are receiving lessons from a Hub Registered Provider they will be entitled to a 100% subsidy up to £5.00 per lesson:

- Currently eligible for Free School Meals (Not including FSM universal entitlement for Infants School pupils)
- Currently in Care

If the child meets the following criteria and is receiving lessons from a Hub Registered Provider they will be entitled 50% subsidy up to £2.50 per lesson:

- Parent/carer in the child's household or child learning is in receipt of Disability Living Allowance (Personal Independence Payment)
- One or more parents/carers in the household are currently serving in the British Armed Forces (As of 1st April 2020)

Please note that the subsidy for services families will be reduced from 100% to 50% with effect of 1st April 2020. This is due to the continued increase in the number of children accessing the subsidy scheme but the amount of funding available being fixed.

Subsidies apply to only one instrument per child and for a maximum of 39 weeks over the year.

#### **UPDATE FROM THE MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGES DEPARTMENT**








#### **EUROPEAN DAY OF LANGUAGES CELEBRATIONS**

## TAKING RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE WASTE GENERATED BY PPE AND SANITISING

As you can imagine, the need to sanitise hands and desks between every lesson is generating a huge increase in plastic use. This week a team of staff, lead by Mr McGregor refilled 160 disinfectant spray bottles and 70 hand sanitiser bottles. The refill team will continue to do this every Wednesday to minimise our plastic use.

Unfortunately, due to the toxic nature of the chemicals used and our need to do this after school, we can't currently involve student in the refilling process, but by reminding your teachers to send their bottles to the DT Prep Room for refilling and perhaps offering to deliver empty bottle, you can play a vital part in this initiative!



Our students are amazing at wearing their masks in communal spaces—
everyone who can, does, with very little need for reminding—and the vast majority of the school community
have their own washable mask. Inevitably, occasionally someone forgets their mask and they can then get a
single use mask from student reception. Obviously we want to keep this to a minimum as we are worried about
their disposal following some worrying articles in the local press about face masks polluting our beaches.

We are currently looking into planning Covid responsible, year group bubble, beach cleans and will keep you posted.

#### **BIKE TO SCHOOL WEEK AND DR BIKE**



Dear Parents/Carers,

As part of our continued commitment to bringing you Safeguarding information and working with Multi Agency Partners, Police have shared this worrying piece of information which I felt I needed to bring to your attention as they are aimed at young people.

Cannabis Gummies – Despite their appearance, cannabis gummies are infused with high levels of (THC) the primary psychoactive component of cannabis and this can be risky for many young people.

The effects of cannabis gummies also last a lot longer than smoking with peak THC blood levels occurring around 3 hrs after consumption, this can result in young people consuming more as the effects are not immediate.


