Spanish Theatre Trip

A group of Year 9 Spanish students visited Truro College on Friday 26th January to watch an adaptation of "El Lazarillo de Tormes" by the Firewalk Theatre Company; an international theatre company based in Zaragoza, Spain, specialising in theatre for language learners of all ages. The company was set up in 1997 and since then tens of thousands of language students all over Spain, the UK and the United Arab Emirates have enjoyed their plays.



This year's play was the 16th century anonymous classic "El Lazarillo de Tormes" which, after "Don Quijote", is arguably the most influential work in Spanish literature. A social satire, it tells the tale of the poor, ever-hungry Lazarillo and his adventures and misadventures with his various masters, presenting thus the reverse image of the glorious Spanish empire and initiating the "picaresco" style.

The students enjoyed the play and did well to understand it, even though it was entirely in Spanish, and one student was even lucky enough to be involved!




Restorative Justice Woekshops

B ack in November, ten year 9 students were selected to take part in a series of workshops about Restorative Justice. It involved looking at how people react to different scenarios, how we can listen more effectively to others and how we can make different choices about our behaviour.

The 3-day workshop, led by Amy and Molly at RJ Working, was really interesting and engaging. Students were challenged to think about ideas from different points of view to their own, something that doesn't always come naturally to us as humans. The students were all highly involved and made excellent contributions over the three days.

This ended with a short presentation in school with a folder of all the different activities they had been a part of. In January 2018, we had the exciting opportunity to attend a celebration of Restorative Justice at Truro Cathedral. Her Royal Highness Princess Anne presented the tokens of celebration to each school that was involved in the project with RJ Working. Two of our students, Luke Richardson and Ocean Thomas, received the award on behalf of the school and talked to Her Royal Highness after the official event.

On Saturday 18th November, our year 9 netball team competed in the County U14 Netball Tournament. We went into the day with high hopes, having been unbeaten in the league so far. Unfortunately, we faced strong competition in our pool from Truro School, Truro High and Penair. We eased ourselves in with some excellent victories, scoring in excess of 15 goals in our first two matches against St Ives and Wadebridge. Then came Truro School. We had only won by one goal in the league so knew this was going to be difficult; however, the Richard Lander team were firing on all cylinders and won 11-8. Following this, we had more convincing wins against Launceston, Brannel and Tretherras. The toughest games came from Truro High School and Penair, where we only won by 1 goal. However, we qualified for the semi-finals in first place, moving on to play Penrice in the next round.

Penrice are a team we have never played before so didn't know what to expect. This turned into a good victory, and progressed to the final. Not only did this mean that we would be competing for 1st or 2nd place, it meant we were automatically representing Cornwall at the regional tournament in January! This had been our aim on the day so winning was going to be a bonus. All the girls were relaxed playing the final game, knowing they had nothing to lose. This attitude stood us apart from Truro School, who had beaten Penryn in the other dramatic semi-final, and we won 13-5!

For what we believe is the first time, Richard Lander School have a team going to the regional tournament of a national competition in netball. Every member of the squad played so well and should be proud of what they have achieved. We will now be heading to Bournemouth on January 27th to play against the other top teams from the South West.



Young Carers: Who are they? What do they do?





Who are **young carers?**

A young carer is someone **under 18** who helps look after someone in their family, or a friend, who is ill, disabled or misuses drugs or alcohol.

How many young carers are

- There are about 700,000 young carers in the UK. (BBC 2010)
- That's about 1 in 12 secondary aged pupils.
- There are likely to be young carers in every school and college.

*The Census identified over 200,000 young carers, but many remain hidden.




Being a young carer can have a big impact on the things that are important to growing up

- It can affect a young person's health, social life and self-confidence.
- Many young carers struggle to juggle their education and caring which can cause pressure and stress.
- In a survey, 39% said that nobody in their school was aware of their caring role.
- 26% have been bullied at school because of their caring role.
- 1 in 20 miss school because of their caring role.

But young people can learn lots of useful skills by being a young carer.

Which one is the young carer?



Young carers are just young people – with caring responsibilities! They look the same as everyone else but they can lead very different lives!

The average age of a young carer

= 13

There are young carers as young as five.

A survey of 350 young carers found 48% were stressed because of their role.

What might a young carer do?

Who do young

carers care for?

Young carers care for someone:

With a mental health condition.

Who misuses drugs or alcohol.

· With an illness or disability.

- Practical tasks, such as cooking, housework and shopping.
- Physical care, such as helping someone out of bed.
- Emotional support, such as talking to someone who is distressed.
- Personal care, such as helping someone dress.
- Managing the family budget and collecting prescriptions.
- Helping to give medicine.
- Helping someone communicate.
- Looking after brothers and sisters.

1 in 3 young carers spend between 11–20 hours each week caring.



Young carers should have:

- The time to be a young person.
- The same opportunities as their friends.
- · Good support for the person they help look after.
- Their rights acknowledged so that they can discuss their needs for support.
