South-West Schools Gymnastics

On the 25th Feburary, 11 gymnasts travelled to Bideford, Devon for the South-West Schools Gymnastics Floor and Vault competition. This was the first time Richard Lander had entered this competition.

First up were the U19 girls. The majority of them are 14/15 years old competing against gymnasts 4/5 years older than them. They performed their floor routines brilliantly and all produced solid vaults. The team narrowly missed out on a bronze medal, Jemma Hamilton and Jenna Dymond were highest performers finishing 10th and 11th overall. The whole team finished inside the top 20 gymnasts in the south-west individually; so a fantastic result!

Next up were the U14 mixed team. There were a couple of forced changes due to injuries so the team really stepped up to produce the best result they could. They all



performed well on the floor but excelled themselves on the vault with Eleysha Penaluna and Luke Richardson both scoring 14.7. The team finished in 3rd place with Luke placing 8th individually so another brilliant result!

Overall the school finished 1st out of the Cornwall teams and 2nd in the South-West so a fantastic effort from all the gymnasts who worked so hard to produce such a great performance in Bideford.

Environment and Sustainability day at University of Exeter

n Thursday the 15th of March 2018, we went to Exeter University on the Penryn Campus. We were greeted by student ambassadors, who were very friendly and showed us where to go for our first activity. This was called 'Decomposers'. We did some forensic entomology, learnt how bodies are broken down and the different bugs which are involved with the process. We also learnt the different body shapes and how to distinguish between the different types of bugs with a key to identify what we were

looking at. We were fortunate to use some of the most amazing microscopes we had ever seen. They had 2 eyepieces to look in!


After break our next activity involved looking at waste and how we handled it; learning what can be recycled and what can't. Some of us were surprised to know that any waste contaminated with food can't be recycled but coloured plastic bottle lids can. We learnt how to repurpose materials to give them a new use.

After a pasty lunch we were challenged to make a poster about what we had learnt in the day. We created 2 posters which included lots of information on the decomposers and recycling. Unfortunately, we lost to Mullion school who had created a poster on plastic free seas. At the very end we had a short talk from a

representative from SAS (Surfers Against Sewage) who gave us some information on plastic free schools which we were interested in and we are hoping to bring the ideas in to school.





Mission to Mars Easter Holidays 2018 April 3rd - 6th

Software Cornwall, with the support of its members, runs 'Mission to Mars', a week-long work experience activity. The program invites budding software developers to code Ada and Alan, our Mars rover robots, allowing them to traverse the tricky Martian terrain in search of extraterrestrial life.

The Mission to Mars work experience programme designed to provide a realistic experience of being a software developer. Working in teams, participants are supported in completing a set of incrementally difficult challenges, each built upon the abilities of the robots. Industry professionals join us throughout the week to coach participants, helping to develop problem-solving skills and writing quality software.

During the mission, applicants will:

- Develop solutions using C++ and Raspberry PI for Arduino based hardware.
- · Work as part of a close-knit team.
- Create software using an Agile development process.
- · Test solutions before deploying onto the rovers.
- Present their product to potential 'investors' and VIPs..

Mission to Mars is part of Software Cornwall's education outreach program, designed to stimulate the computing industry from the ground up. In 2017, Cornwall was ranked in the top three tech clusters for growth, for the third year running but the worst for computing subject uptake in education. To support future growth, we are investing in learners from a young age, which is hoped to increase the pool of home grown talent for the wider tech industry within the county.
