
A huge highlight for many was the wake and shake where Mr

"Oh Emily," she says "Our hope is with you,


your friends and their brothers and their sisters too,

School uniform is available from Trutex all year round. Postage and packaging is free on orders over £50 or just £3.50 for orders under. Trutex will normally deliver within 7 working days. However during the busiest time towards the start of back to school this can be extended.

The school will hold one sample of each item of stock and in every size. Parents who want to check their child's size by trying on an item before they buy it on-line, they are welcome to do so by contacting your child's Pastoral Manager.

Castles will be judged in your history lessons. Your teacher will give you the exact date for your class judging and it is important that this is written into your planner.


Judges will be looking for historical accuracy as well as imagination.

# Stop norovirus spreading this winter

Norovirus, sometimes known as the 'winter vomiting bug', is the most common stomach bug in the UK, affecting people of all ages. It is highly contagious and is transmitted by contact with contaminated surfaces, an infected person, or consumption of contaminated food or water.

The symptoms of norovirus are very distinctive – people often report a sudden onset of nausea followed by projectile vomiting and watery diarrhoea.



Good hand hygiene is important to stop the spread of the virus.

## People are advised to:

- Wash their hands thoroughly using soap and water and drying them after using the toilet, before preparing food and eating
- Not rely on alcohol gels as these do not kill the virus

An infection with norovirus is self-limiting and most people will make a full recovery in 1-2 days. It is important to keep hydrated – especially children and the elderly.

Do not visit either A&E or GPs with symptoms as this may spread the virus.
