- List what you plan to read (remember all reading is good reading!) on the inside of the sponsor card.
- Ask friends and family to sponsor you per page, per book, per ten minutes, whatever suits you.

www.readforgood/sponsor - and means you don't have to worry about handing money in to school

If they can't sponsor you online, they write it on your sponsor card and give you cash or a cheque to take into school. Remember, never ask strangers to sponsor you.

What is the money used for?

- The money you raise helps to buy brand new books and storyteller visits for children in hospital.
- Books and stories cheer kids up, relieve the boredom and help children in hospital to feel a bit better. !
- And our school will get to choose free books vouchers worth 20% of the money we raise!

- It feels good to help seriously ill children.
- My school will get free books!
- Kids who choose to read for fun are more likely to do well at school, in their GCSEs and 'A' levels, and later in life!

- Remember the money you raise will be helping lots of children in hospital.




Due to Covid-19, it was not possible to invite a large live audience along, but Susan Lay's beautiful film really captures the creative process in the lead up, along with the performance itself.




YEAR 11 DT SCAMPER TASK



STUDYING MICROPLASTICS AND MAKING BIOPLASTICS

> tudents from year 10 and year 11 including several from our Eco team and Women in STEM were given the opportunity to make their own bio plastic thanks to an amazing workshop run by Janine Bisson, the Stem Project Coordinator at the Education Business Partnership along with Libby Challoner, a final year student at Falmouth University studying Sustainable Production, which combines design with science. Libby explained that, as it's "easy to make bioplastics" then "why aren't we doing more of it?"



Students carefully separated out samples provided from various beaches into primary microplastics (those manufactured to be small such as nurdles and biobeads) and secondary microplastics (larger items that have been broken down ie by wave action). They then counted them to determine which beach they may have come from. Students spent time considering why the content is different at different sites.


Later students were given instructions for making their own bio plastic using agar extracted from seaweed collected locally, corn-starch and glycerol. They were able to experiment with proportions to change the properties of the plastic that they made, and add dyes to change their colour. Moulds were provided so that students could make various objects including dinosaurs and bees and honeycomb.

The students were commended on their interest and enthusiasm, and were equally excited to be able to take home their home-made bioplastic products. A big thankyou to Miss Cornish for organising such an inspirational opportunity for our students.
