RLS WASTE LESS CANTEEN - THE LAUNCH

V n Monday 15th November, Richard Lander School, in partnership with Autograph Catering who run our school canteen, launched our Waste Less Canteen initiative to reduce our school's single use waste to a minimum. All our rubbish is currently incinerated, creating CO2 emissions which cause global warming and climate change and whilst we know that incineration is preferable to landfill, we also know that reducing waste through reuse is much better than both. This was confirmed when our Eco Team visited the Cornwall energy recovery centre near St Dennis, in 2019. It was a really excellent, informative school trip and we are grateful to SUEZ for facilitating it.

So .. Since Monday 15th November, washables have been replacing disposables in the school canteen with tea plates, all cutlery, main meal pates, bowls and pasta pots already replaced, with salad pots and dessert pots soon to follow. (Pasta pots were a particular 'bugbear' as the canteen could sell up to 200 per day, and although they were labelled 'recyclable' they were always contaminated with food waste, so couldn't actually be recycled in school.

To launch the initiative, the Eco Team made a video to explain the rationale behind the canteen improvements and to show students how to use the new waste clearing systems. This video was shown to the whole school at 8:30am on Monday 15th, along with an address from Mr Webb – Assistant Headteacher. Since then Miss Wright, Mr Mulcahy and Mr Webb have helped out with the changeover at break time and lunchtime, along with RLS Duke of Edinburgh student volunteers and our great team of lunchtime supervisors and duty staff.

Out student body have been amazing at accepting the change, which inevitably comes at the cost of a small amount of inconvenience for them. The first 2 weeks have gone really well and the challenges, such as having quite a small canteen, have been managed. In just 2 weeks, thousands of items of single use waste have been avoided, with students still able to sit and enjoy their meal together, whether they are eating a packed lunch or school dinner.

Our school Eco Team has been working on this for some time, presenting to school Senior Leadership Team and school governors, along with meeting with mangers from Cornwall Council, Mitie/Interserve & Autograph. The initiative would simply not have been possible without the support of our amazing governing body and the hard





work of our canteen staff, in particular Sonia, our manager. Thank you all!

We look forward to introducing a new TerraCycle 'bin' next week which will allow our packed lunch students with crisp bags and chocolate biscuit wrappers to terracycle these. These initiatives along with Mrs Knight's used pen recycling, the DT department's milk bottle, gluestick, HDPE and PPE shredding and pressing, and the school recycling bins should really help to reduce our school's waste. If you are interested in joining the Eco Team, please speak to your Geography teacher or come along to a meeting. Meetings are held every Wednesday from 3pm—3:45pm. If you can't make the meetings but are interested in helping out during your lunchtimes, perhaps to work towards your Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award, please see Miss Wright.



RICHARD LANDER YOUTH ACTIVISTS HOUSING CRISIS IN CORNWALL

he RLS Youth Activists petition on the housing crisis in Cornwall has been a great success. Students presented a really informative assembly to all of Key Stage 3 via 'Lander Talks' and then held a lunchtime stall during KS3/4 lunchtime to encourage students to sign their petition.

During the talk, students learned that to buy an average home in Cornwall, a purchaser would typically need 8.7 average salaries! This has resulted in 16,000 people seeking housing association accommodation with only 40 properties currently empty. RLS Youth Activists have been inspired by a referendum held in St Ives in 2016, which sought to reserve new houses for local residents. 80% voted in favour.


The RLS Youth Activist petition seeks to reduce and place a limit on the number of second homes in Cornwall, and to build truly affordable homes for the future. It will give our MPs an idea of the concerns of young people in Cornwall.

In addition our non uniform collection raised £1253.08. Well done to everyone who took part and donated. Here are some of the local charities which have benefitted from Children in Need funding in the past 18 months.

Cornwall Music Service Trust: This project will provide music therapy to children who are seriously ill with chronic, complex and life threatening health issues. The sessions will help to increase self-esteem, improve emotional wellbeing and reduce isolation.













CLEAR: Emotional Trauma and Therapy Specialists: This project provides counselling for children who have witnessed or have been directly affected by abuse. The sessions will help them cope better with the effects of the trauma, help them manage their emotions and develop strategies to stay safe

First Light South West Ltd: This project will deliver support services for children and young people experiencing domestic abuse. The services will reduce feelings of isolation, increase understanding healthy relationships improve self-esteem

This is me counselling and psychotherapy CIC: This project will provide 1:1 counselling support for children experiencing stress or trauma. These sessions will improve mental wellbeing and confidence and help build positive relationships


















YEAR 7 SPACE COMPETITION

Modern Foreign Languages GINGERBREAD HOUSE COMPETITION

<u>Then:</u>

The tradition of decorated gingerbread houses began in Germany in the early 1800s, supposedly popularised after the not-so-Christmassy fairytale of Hansel and Gretel was published in 1812. The Grimms' original fairy tale includes the line: "When they came nearer they saw that the house was built of bread, and roofed with cakes, and the window was of transparent sugar." (In later versions it became gingerbread, rather than just bread.) Inspired by the story, German bakers began to craft small decorated houses from lebkuchen, spiced honey biscuits.

The origins of gingerbread are not precise. Ginger root was first cultivated in China around 5,000 years ago, and was thought to have medicinal and magical properties. When its usefulness as a preservative was discovered is unclear, but some food historians say that the first known recipe for gingerbread dates from



around 2400 BC in Greece. Others trace its history to 992 AD, when Armenian monk Gregory of Nicopolis is thought to have taught Christian bakers in France how to make it. Later references include a gingerbread guild in Germany, probably formed in the 15th century to protect the rights of certain bakers. At around the same time, nuns in Sweden were baking gingerbread to ease indigestion.

Now:

The modern tradition of making gingerbread houses has become a family event at Christmas markets around the world.

<u>The task:</u>

You need to collect a recipe from the MFL base (from 1st December) in the language that you are studying. If you aren't studying a language, you have a choice of language! You then need to bake, construct, and decorate your house!

Be as imaginative as you like. The sky's the limit!

Prizes will be awarded under three categories: *Taste sensation Showstopper Wild card*

Entries need to be in the MFL base by midday on Friday 10th December and prizes will be awarded on the following Monday. Houses need to be boxed and clearly labelled with your name, year group and tutor's name. You can work as a group on it, if you wish, and please include names of everybody who took part. It would be great if you could take photos of you making the house as well. We will put this all online to show off our starbakers!

Explain to your school community

- Write & publicise a 'no idling' policy for staff, parents and visitors to the school, including deliveries and public transport
- Get pupils to design posters and banners to promote clean air zones around the school gates

Set up a car-free day

- Let parents and pupils know
- · Get your Eco-council involved
- · Incentivise Active Travel with house points, golden time etc.
- Consider a regular, incentivised Active Travel day

- · Free time walking/running/scooting/cycling

- · Have a non-uniform 'dress green & blue for the planet' day
- Run a 'bike breakfast' or 'scooter snacks', with edible treats for pupils who walk, scoot or cycle to school that day


