Some reading below if you are interested in Miss Payne's Mum's story.

My name is Claire Payne (Emilie's Mum). I'm taking part in the London Marathon this April and have a charity place in aid of Bowel Cancer UK. This is a charity close to my heart, as my best friend, Karen, was diagnosed with Stage 4 bowel cancer 5 years' ago & had to have the cancer removed from her bowel and a liver resection as well as

chemo. Unfortunately last year the cancer returned in her lung, so she had to have a lung resection, as well as 6 months' of chemo & unfortunately after having a PET scan the results were inconclusive, so she had to have another lung resection at the end of December. This operation was successfully carried out & Karen got the good news last week that no cancer was found in the histology report! Her husband, Steve, (they live 200 miles from us) has also gained a charity place for Bowel Cancer UK in the London Marathon & we are going to run together for Karen & raise money for this amazing charity, so that we can double the amount raised! Karen has already raised £750 during chemo by doing a sponsored swim last year! This spurred Steve & I on to raise money together by running in the London marathon this year.

Here are the merits scores just before half term —and there have been many more earned since! Week 18 proved to be a very high earning week for students as every 'celebration' which was awarded in the 'cause for celebration' reports which went home to parents earned an extra merit. The table above shows a staggering 98% of Year 7 and Year 8 have now received at least one certificate with Year 9, Year 10 and Year 11 close behind.

The majority of merits are awarded by class teachers and support staff but students can also qualify for automatic merits:

- Every student receives a merit for 100% attendance in a week
- 10 merits for 100% attendance in a term
- A merit for being a top ten merit earner in any given week
- CFCs a merit for every "celebration" earned
- BFLs 10 merits for every student in the top 10 percentile rank

Every merit earned counts toward to total number of trees we plant in Uganda and also counts towards your personal total, leading to awards: Bronze - 100 merits, Silver—200 merits, Gold—400 merits, Platinum—600 merits, Diamond—800 merits.

Ms Robertson's tutor group is leading the school in both attendance and merits with an average attendance of 95.49% and 320.7 merits. Well done to everyone in RRRo.






TAKE YOUR CHILD TO WORK DAY





CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH WEEK

he week before half term was Children's Mental Health Week and the theme was "Let's Connect'"

'Let's connect is about making meaningful connections with others. People thrive in communities and at Richard Lander School we all have our own community that we are a part of. For me, that's Towan! These connections are vital for the wellbeing of ourselves and those around us. When we have healthy connections, to our family, friends and those around us, this can support our mental health and our wellbeing. For children's mental health week this year, we are encouraging people to connect with others in healthy, rewarding and meaningful ways.



Tutors have been sent a number of resources to use during tutor sessions this week. These include a range of videos and activities to complete with students. One of my favourites is exchanging postcards. This is where students look at what connection means to them. They create a postcard with someone else, each designing a half of a postcard before swapping with someone else. This allows students to think about what connection means to them, before looking at what that means to the other person as well. This could be togetherness, religion, faith, the natural world. The postcards are put into a swap pile, so that someone else can take another and connect a new image created by person two, to the image already created by the first person. DISRUPTION DUE TO INDUSTRIAL ACTION—FEBRUARY/MARCH 2023

Dear Parents/Carers,

You may be aware from media coverage that the NEU have proposed up to 4 days of industrial action which will take place on the following dates:-

1 February 2 March 15 March 16 March

These days of industrial action are in response to a dispute between the NEU and the government over teachers' pay.

I am writing to parents/carers to give as much notice as possible that school based learning will likely be disrupted on these dates. This will likely mean year groups being required to remain at home and to study from online resources. School based learning will only be offered to specific year groups / vulnerable children or families where both parents are 'key workers'. Our guiding principle through this will be to do our best to provide education to all pupils whilst ensuring the safeguarding of pupils who are required to attend school on these dates.

For your information, most of our teaching staff are members of the NEU union.

The senior team are currently considering how best to steer student learning during this time and will communicate with parents once our plans have been formulated.

We recommend that parents/carers start to make alternative childcare arrangements for these dates.

In advance of this action, we do apologise for the potential disruption caused to you and to your child's education.

We are working closely with our staff union representatives to keep up to date with the situation, and we will inform parents/carers of our intended actions in due course.
