

Well done to everyone who took part in World Book Day!




















#### **MFL UPDATE**

# La journée mondiale du livre/El día mundial del libro (otherwise known as World Book Day!)

o celebrate World Book Day, KS3 classes in both French and Spanish were tasked with translating book titles from the target language into English using their dictionary skills to improve their vocabulary. Classes were also introduced to the intricacies of translation, were challenged to translate some Roald Dahl passages from the target languages into English and looked at the difficulties translators faced when translating the Harry Potter books.

This links in with the launch of The Anthea Bell Prize for Young Translators which is an annual competition run by Queen's College, Oxford. This is the second year that our students have entered this

prestigious competition and they have been tasked with translating a passage from a classic French or Spanish novel or poem into English.



World Book Day also saw the launch of our MFL library. The department have a wide range of reading material in both French and Spanish accessible to all year groups, ranging from cultural magazines to novels on the A level syllabus. Students will be using the MFL library in lessons to read authentic texts and improve their vocabulary as well as encouraging them to nurture a love of learning. Our KS4 students are welcome to borrow novels and texts that they might even study at A level if there were to continue with a language beyond GCSE.

# INTERNATIONAL LEGO LEAGUE

he RLS Lego League team travelled to RNAS
Culdrose last week to compete in the International Lego
League. LEGO League introduces science, technology,
engineering, and mathematics (STEM) to children
through fun, exciting hands-on learning. Participants
gain real-world problem solving experience through a
guided, global robotics program, helping today's
students and teachers build a better future together.

The students carried out a 40 minute presentation, created a short film about renewable energy, and took the robot they built to show the judges their coding skills. The robot had to activate elements on the Lego map, collecting and distributing energy cells.

They worked so hard and walked away with a trophy for their 'innovation project' in which they had to design a new way of harnessing renewables!

The team designed an offshore wind turbine, anchored to the sea bed using a geothermal telescope. The turbine would power a village like St Agnes. They considered how this could impact local sea life, and created a base structure to house an artificial kelp forest so that sea life would thrive

# Music For Youth Festival

On Friday 3rd March, Miss Foxon and Mr Gibbons took the school orchestra and the jazz band to the Music for Youth festival, held at Truro Methodist Church.

Music for Youth is the UK's largest youth music festival. It takes place between February and April in over 30 locations nationwide and welcomes around 30,000 young musicians to take part in performances across the UK.

The festival was a fantastic chance for our young musicians to perform and share their music, listen to performances from other groups, meet other musicians and gain expert advice from professional musicians and Music for Youth Music Mentors. Both the RLS Jazz Band and the school



orchestra received some really excellent feedback from the event.

Our finest musicians will be out on the road next week too with over 80 students taking part in the Cornwall Music Festival; competing as soloists and group performers.

#### YEAR 10 FISH HEROES TO COOK ALASKA PINK SALMON

e are delighted to be one of 250 schools in the UK that have received Alaska pink salmon, courtesy of the Food Teachers Centre and Alaska Seafood UK - 10,000 salmon fillets were sent to schools and Richard Lander School was one of these lucky schools!

The donation of the salmon is part of the Fish Heroes project, which encourages young people to learn about, cook and taste fish. Pupils also learned about the health benefits of fish in the diet (did you know that we are all recommended to each 2 portions a week?) as well as aspects of sustainability.

Children in the UK eat just 84g of fish/fish products a week, of which only 21g is oily fish - way below recommendations.

Mrs Toms and Miss Barnett's Year 10 Hospitality & Catering students will be learning new food skills which they will be able to use in the future.

As part of a practical lesson, students will make one of a choice of dishes ranging from salmon quiche, and breaded salmon goujons, to pan seared salmon and salmon & broccoli pasta bake. They will also taste the salmon dishes they have prepared. Watch this space for pictures of the final dishes that our Year 10's create!

There are two more training expeditions before the event and we hope to enter two teams of six students.












# INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY


tar gymnast, Mawgan in TEBa, recently travelled to Florida to compete in an international gymnastics competition!

#### **ATTENDANCE: OUR VISION FOR ATTENDANCE**

We want our students to 'be the best they can be' by attending school regularly and punctually. Richard Lander School deems 'good' attendance to be above 96%.

Regular attendance and excellent punctuality are the foundations for academic achievement and personal development. They help students fully access their education and wider opportunities offered by the school. Attendance and punctuality are also linked to students' well-being and safety.

We are committed to ensuring that all students benefit from the opportunities available at Richard Lander School. Our expectation is that students arrive on time and attend school regularly.

Parents/carers have responsibility for ensuring that their children attend school punctually and regularly so they can benefit from a valuable education.

The school has a legal responsibility for maintaining school registers and taking the register twice a day, in addition to our individual lesson registers. The school also has a responsibility for reporting absence to the Local Authority.

The school also has a safeguarding responsibility and this links to good punctuality and attendance.

The school will communicate attendance matters to parents via text, telephone, email, and letter as well as through the school website.

The school will meet with students whose attendance is below 95%, reviewing the barriers to good attendance and offering support strategies for improvement.

Our next round of student interviews will take place the W/C 20th March, all students within the 50%-85% attendance category will be asked to attend an attendance support meeting with a member of staff from either the Pastoral, Attendance or Senior Leadership Team. These meetings will take place in school time.



#### **MOCK INTERVIEWS - YEAR 10**

Y10 students will be taking part in 'mock interviews' on Tuesday 21st March ('P' population) and Wednesday 22nd March ('Q' population).

These interviews will be with a selection of around 17 different employers. Each student will have a 20 minute time slot, this will involve a 10 minute interview and then time for some written feedback. Students will know their time slot at the beginning of next week. The interviews will take place in the drama studios & the main hall, so all students will be interviewed individually in a group environment.

Students may not be interviewed by an employer within a sector that they are interested in, but the day should give students an idea of what it is like to speak with an employer and be able to talk about their skills, interests and aspirations.

This will prepare them for interviews for work experience, summer jobs and their college interview next year.

We are allowing students to wear their own clothes so that they feel comfortable having their interview. However we are expecting clothing to be suitable for a 'standard' interview. Students can wear suits, dresses, smart casual clothing, we do not wish to see any crop tops, ripped jeans, t-shirts with inappropriate slogans - we need them to realise that this is NOT a non-school uniform day, it is an interview day. We do not expect parents to go out and purchase new clothes just for this day, students can also wear their smart school uniform.

# TIME2MOVE EASTER HOLIDAY PROGRAMME

Active Cornwall have just launched the Easter Time2Move Holiday Programme which aims to support families during the school holidays to ensure children have access to fun activities, healthy food and physcial activity and to address those particular challenges for some families because of increased costs such as food, childcare and reduced income.

It brings together providers across Cornwall who put on a wide range of diverse activities that are fully funded for those eligible for benefits related free school meals but available to all children aged 5 to 16.

Easter activities will run from April 3rd to the 7th and the 10th to the 14th and all children that attend will receive a healthy meal.

Children eligible for benefits related free school meals can access a unique code to access the provision free of charge. 

# VAPING AND E-CIGARETTES: THE FACTS FOR PARENTS AND CARERS



This leaflet is to support parents and carers to have conversations with their children about vaping.



#### WHAT IS VAPING?

Vaping is the use of an electronic device to inhale vapour derived from a heated liquid. The main ingredients are vegetable glycerine and propylene glycol, but most e-liquids also contain nicotine, which must be no more than 2% or 2mg per ml, as well as small amounts of flavourings and sweeteners.

#### **SMOKING VS VAPING**

Smoking is much more harmful than vaping. Tobacco smoke contains carbon monoxide and tar, a sticky soup of around 250 toxic chemicals, 69 of which are known to be carcinogenic, causing disease, disability, and early death.

#### HOWEVER, VAPES Are not harmless

Short-term effects can include:

- coughing
- headaches
- dizziness, and
- sore throats.

Long-term effects are, as yet, unknown.

# WHAT ARE THE CONCERNS WITH VAPING AND CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE?

Most children and young people don't vape or smoke. However, in 2022 the number of 11-17-year-olds in Great Britain currently using vapes rose to 7% compared to 4% in 2020. Whilst this increase is concerning, it is important to note that most vaping is experimental, with regular vaping mainly confined to children who currently smoke or have done in the past.

The increase in youth vaping has coincided with the arrival on the UK market of a new category of cheap and attractive disposable vapes that have proven particularly popular with children and young people and have been promoted extensively on social media. We are working hard nationally and locally to address these issues.

#### HOW DO VAPES HELP Smokers quit?

Like nicotine patches and gum, vapes containing nicotine are a useful aid to quitting as they deal with the cravings smokers get when they try to stop. Nicotine vapes are proven effective and have become the most popular quitting aid for smokers in recent years. However, vapes are not recommended for non-smokers, particularly children.





#### THE LAW AND VAPING

Vapes and vaping products containing nicotine, like tobacco, are age restricted. It's illegal to sell them to under 18s, and for adults to buy them on their behalf.

If you know of anyone who does sell vapes or tobacco illegally, you can report them to trading standards through the Citizens Advice online portal:

Advertising of all tobacco products is illegal, but if you see advertising for vapes that you feel is trying to encourage children and young people to try vaping, you can report it to the Advertising Standards Authority:

#### HAVING CONVERSATIONS WITH YOUR CHILD ABOUT VAPING?

#### Find the right moment

when you see someone vaping, walk past a vape shop or see advertisements.

**Ask questions** what do they think about vaping? Do they know people who vape? Why do they think people vape?

**Listen to them** learn from them, but also use your knowledge to help them understand the facts and that vapes are not harmless.

#### Talk about your expectations

explain your concerns and tell them why you don't want them to vape or smoke and to make clear that although neither are recommended, smoking is the far greater risk. Let them know that you care about them explain that those who knowingly sell vapes to under 18s don't care who they sell to and they are just interested in making money

# Talk about the different reasons why children may vape give

examples such as wanting to fit in, curiosity, stress. Talk through effective ways to respond if they ever feel pressured to try it and practise responding together.

If your child is vaping try to understand why they are vaping by asking questions like "What do you enjoy about vaping?" Or "How does vaping make you feel?". Understanding this might help you to understand their needs and discuss other ways to meet those needs.
