



Richard Lander Racing Win Greenpower International Final To Become 5th Time World Champions!

On Sunday 8th October 2023, Richard Lander Racing competed in the Greenpower International Final held at Goodwood.

Students in the Richard Lander School Greenpower team were challenged to design, build and race electric cars for the project run by UK charity Greenpower Education Trust and then then compete to cover the furthest distance in 90 minutes.

RLR cars are very lightweight with great aerodynamics and

the team spends hours preparing and tweaking their designs. Both of our team's cars qualified for the final which saw RLR3 and RLR4 go up against over 100 other cars from countries including Brazil and Portugal.

The results of the International Final simply could not have been better with Richard Lander Racing taking first and second place, and a track record as a bonus!

O oing into the 2023 season, knowing I would be managing the car I had won a championship in 5 months prior, I had many mixed feelings. Feelings of pressure to perform and showing I was the right student to do this job, but also a sense of pride that I was trusted to be responsible for a car which had won previously in such dramatic fashion.

We started off this season at a familiar and fondly memorised track, the Goodwood motor circuit. For this season, we had implemented and rigorously tested the newer-spec motors, hoping for a boost in power and to regenerate the dominance we'd had since 2017. However, smooth running was wholly opposite to what we were greeted with. After incredibly impressive times throughout practice, we were excited to see the performance in the race. All ran smoothly for the first 80 minutes, our pit stops were carried out well and we were extremely happy with how everything was, and confident. But, due to our slight overestimate, and becoming way too comfortable, the win was snatched on the final lap due to the extreme battery depletion of our cars, and we knew we needed to make significant changes gearing-wise. These changes made a difference, but it wasn't drastic enough. We finished the day third overall. Not all bad as we went into the weekend blind, and learnt significant amounts where, in a month's time, we would take on the inaugural race at the Chivenor Airbase.

We set off to Chivenor early, hoping to gain valuable information. However, the track we were met with was uneven and had an extremely loose surface, which would challenge us all. As practice commenced, I wheeled RLR4 out to the end of the pits, somewhat sceptical of how this may end. Around 5 minutes later, the red flag was waved and worry filled me - RLR4 was off. We waited by the track, butterflies in my stomach, wondering what state the car may be in. Seeing an ambulance come into view











did not fill me with any hope. The car came back on the recovery truck- if my heart hadn't dropped already, it had dropped now. It was in pieces, parts hanging off and the bodywork shredded in places. This was bad. Incredibly bad. After an assessment of the damage and the state our driver was in, my first big decision as manager came - to race, or not to race? In the end, we would sit out the first race, but take place in the second.

It came to the time to race. RLR3 had ran an OK race 1, however retired near the end. Race 2 began, and an intense 20-minute battle ensued, only to be ended by issues on both cars. We discovered RLR3 had destroyed its own drive wheel, and RLR4's steering had fully given out. It was the end of a painful day for RLR4's team, but RLR3 managed to scrape a podium, which gave some purpose to what had been an incredibly enduring day. It was now time to buckle down and fix the damage done before September, where the business-end of the season begins.

September came around, and the team was ready and set for the final push of the season. As a manager this tends to be the most stressful part of the year, as you know what your car is capable of, but it's now down to you to execute and fulfil that! One thing to know about a wet race weekend is



that it makes everything A LOT harder, for drivers, mechanics and pretty much everyone involved. We arrived at Castle Combe for race day, and were met with a somewhat stress-free practice, and the weather stayed kind to us. However, as I walked off the grid, down came the rain, and it poured. For the rest of the day we were met with lashing rain, but the drivers, battling with the spray more than other cars, held their nerve and in race 1 we came away with a 1-3, with RLR3 returning to the top spot for the first time over the year, however in race 2 it wasn't as fortunate, as its race was ended prematurely by a very heavy crash, with us now facing the question of would it even be able to race at the finals in 3 weeks? However, we still had a car left in it, and thanks to a risky strategy RLR4 came away with the victory. We had finished on a high, but the next 3 weeks were bound to be extremely tough.

After many late nights, the weekend of the International Final had rolled around. It came down to this, and what a weekend it was. We had a flawless qualifier race with both cars excelling, beating any other competition by over a lap. We had done half the job, now was taking the momentum into race 2, where it was all or nothing. After enduring the heat, RLR3 completed an impeccable lights-to-flag victory, and RLR4 followed it up in the runner-up position, with another astonishingly dominant race for both cars.

In an incredibly up-and-down yet record-smashing season, the whole team can be so, so proud of themselves, and as a manager the best feeling is seeing all the hard work and dedication you have put in end up with a result on track and happy faces to go with it. The feeling of seeing your cars cross the line first and second is unmatched, and brings a feeling of satisfaction like no other. Richard Lander Racing are now 5-time world champions!
