Year 7 Medieval Castles History Competition - The Final

Ver 300 castles have been brought to school over the past few weeks, where a whole lesson was dedicated to students talking about their castles and how they designed and made them. Three castles from each group were then selected to go through to the final round.

The designs you see here are examples of those which were selected by their classmates and teachers as the very best in their classes. And no wonder, because the attention to detail, historical accuracy and execution of design really is rather remarkable in this work. The standard was incredibly high this year and choosing just three from each class was very tough!

This year we have seen a great range of materials being used – but some stand out castles include one made from concrete, one enormous Motte and Bailey sandcastle using materials found at the beach, a third from pieces of plumbing which were transformed with spray paint to resemble granite walls, and one made from materials we collect in school such as glue sticks and the plastic sheets our DT Eco Team produces.

What is LGBT+ History Month?

- LGBT+ History Month first took place in the UK in 2005 and it now takes place in February every year!
- This month raises awareness on the impact that LGBT+ people have had on history and recognise their achievements in shaping all of our lives today
- Celebrating LGBT+ History Month means learning about some of the amazing LGBT+ historical icons that have trail blazed through history and brought about changes that benefit us all.

Why LGBT+ History Month is important?

- Today, LGBT+ people in the UK are able to live more openly than ever before.
- It is legal for them to:
- Openly identify as LGBT+
- Get married
- Have families
- Compete in sports
- Access healthcare
- Access careers such as politicians
- Be served in establishments like restaurants and hotels

Section 28

- In 1533 it was made illegal to be homosexual on penalty of death. This was only fully repealed after 400+years in 1967.
- In 1988 Section 28 made it so that schools and local authorities could not openly support or talk about LGBT+ identities.
- This wasn't repealed until 2003.
- LGBT+ people did not receive full protections from discrimination until the introduction of the **Equality Act 2010.**

Food Waste by Emily Blight, Daisy Goodwin and Elizabeth New – Year 8 Towan

here are so many ways food waste is harmful or even dangerous and one of them is it damages the environment. This happens because a proportion of food waste ends up in landfill where it rots and releases methane, adding to climate change and global warming. This can affect the air quality and our health as well. It's not just the food being wasted, all the resources that went into making it (energy, water, land etc) are wasted too.

Food waste doesn't just affect the environment it also affects you economically. The average cost of a food shop is £195. Per month, a fifth of the food will be thrown away meaning £39 will be wasted, and of that £35 worth of food will still be safe to eat. But you can stop these things happening by reusing leftovers to make a new meal: Why not try...

Leftover vegetable soup Bubble and squeak-made from cooked potatoes and cabbage mixed together and fried salad Bread and butter pudding

Or you could even use old, brown bananas to make **banana bread** – Why not give this recipe a go!

140g butter, softened, plus extra for the tin
140g caster sugar
2 large eggs, beaten
140g self-rising flour
1 tsp baking powder
2 very ripe bananas, mashed
50g icing sugar
Handful dried banana chips, for decoration



Method

Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4.
Butter a 2lb loaf tin and line the base and sides with baking parchment.
Cream 140g softened butter and 140g caster sugar until light and fluffy, then slowly add 2 beaten large eggs with a little of the 140g flour.
Fold in the remaining flour, 1 tsp baking powder and 2 mashed bananas
Pour the mixture into the prepared tin and bake for about 50 mins, or until cooked through. Check the loaf at 5-min intervals from around 30-40 mins in the oven by testing it with a skewer (it should be able to be inserted and removed cleanly), as the time may vary depending on the shape of your loaf tin.
Cool in the tin for 10 mins, then remove to a wire rack.
Mix 50g icing sugar with 2-3 tsp water to make a runny icing.

The link between attendance and attainment is clear:

- In 2018/19, just 40% of persistently absent (PA) children in KS2 achieved expected KS2 standards, compared with 84% of pupils who were regular attenders.
- · And 36% of PA children in KS4 got 9 to 4 in their English and maths GCSEs, also compared with 84% of regular attenders.¹

And it's never too late to benefit from good attendance:

• More than half (54%) of pupils who were PA in Year 10 and then rarely absent in Year 11, passed at least 5 GCSEs, compared to 36% of pupils who were persistently absent in both years.²

But attendance is important for more than just attainment:

 Regular school attendance can facilitate positive peer relationships, which is a protective factor for mental health and wellbeing.³
